
COVID-19Brief



Here is the brief for Friday 26 March 2021.

Grampian data The local figures for today and the 7 day rolling positivity rate are shown below. As a reminder, this rate is arrived at by dividing the number of positive tests in the past 7 days by the number of tests carried out in the past 7 days. Repeat tests are included in both categories, whereas the figures we show here only record new tests. Organ Donation – change in the law As of today, the law on organ donation in Scotland has changed, with the country moving to an 'opt-out' system. Put simply, all those aged 16 and over will now be considered willing to donate their organs, unless they have explicitly opted out of donation. Fewer than 1% of us will die in circumstances where we could donate our organs or tissue, so we are all still encouraged to add our names to the organ donation register and discuss our decision with our family members. Many of you will be familiar with the story of local artist Brian Keeley, who had a massive heart attack in 2013, leaving him critically ill and in need of a transplant. Along with his wife (and fellow artist) Bibo, he created an exhibition about their experience, entitled The Shared Heart.
